Meet Our Elder



Elder Vera Pawis Tabobondung

Senator Vera is a proud Anishinaabe woman from the Wasauksing First Nation - an Ojibway, Odawa and Pottawatomi First Nation located on Parry Island in Georgian Bay. She first began her life work as the Executive Director for the Parry Sound Indian Friendship Centre and has served in many prominent roles within the Friendship Centre Movement (FCM). Senator Vera is a past President

of the Ontario Federation of Indigenous Friendship Centres (OFIFC), past President of the NAFC, has served her First Nation community as a Councillor and has participated on numerous boards and committees locally, provincially, and nationally.

Meet Our Leadership



ORC Glen Hare

Glen Gwiingos Hare is the Ontario Regional Chief. First Nation Chiefs elected him as a candidate for the Ontario Regional Chief on June 16, 2022. He has been happily married for 49 years to his wife Sally and with the support of my four boys, he stated he is ready to work for the Nations as the Ontario Regional Chief. He knows about commitment to family and communities. His familiarity with key Government Provincial and

Federal levels is what he brings to the table, after all the advocacy at the Chiefs of Ontario level is crucial to addressing First Nation priorities.



Grand Chief Abram Benedict

Abram Benedict is currently the Grand Chief for the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne. In the position of Grand Chief, Abram leads a dynamic Council of 12 members that govern the Mohawk Community of Akwesasne. The Mohawk Council of Akwesasne is an advanced First Nation community that delivers a wide variety of services to its members. Akwesasne is uniquely located on the international boundaries of

Canada, the United States and the provincial borders of Ontario and Quebec.

As an advanced community government, one of the Council priorities is to improve the services offered to its members. By embracing change through the utilization of modern approaches and enhanced governance structures, the Mohawk Council has set out to modernize the organization through embracing its senior-level management down to its front-line staff to effect positive change. As the Grand Chief for Akwesasne Abram has successfully led several successful negotiations, including two significant land claims that will help advance Akwesasne's priorities with proceeds of over \$280 million. Other negotiations include cooperative land use agreement, union negotiations, government contribution agreements, and civil disputes.



Chief Stacey Laforme

R. Stacey Laforme is the elected Chief of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN). Born and raised on MCFN, Chief Laforme has served his community for over twenty years being first elected to council in 1999. Chief Laforme is committed to increasing involvement and communication between Elected Council and both on and offreserve membership. He is very active throughout

MCFN's Treaty Lands and Territory, which encompasses 3.9 million acres of Southern Ontario, not only as a Chief, but as a notable storyteller, poet and published author. Chief Laforme has recently been appointed as honorary senior fellow for Massey College, joining the Duke of Edinburg and the Chancellor of Oxford as only the third person awarded the highest honor the college can bestow. In 2018, De dwa da dehs nye (Aboriginal Health Centre) awarded Chief R. Stacey Laforme the Walter Cooke Wisdom Keeper Award in recognition of one's capacity to exemplify significant and continuous service to our community by demonstrating integrity, generosity of spirit, humility, courage, collaboration, "The Good Mind", and traditional ways of knowing and being.

Harold Tarbell

Harold Tarbell is a member of the Mohawk Nation at Akwesasne, located in Ontario, Quebec and New York State. Previous work experiences includes serving as a Tribal Chief (1987-1990), Multicultural programs coordinator, Land Claims research and community development officer, Assistant Director for Parliamentary Liaison, Executive Director of the National Aboriginal Management Board, Executive

Director of Buffy Sainte Marie's Cradleboard Teaching Project, and Chief of Staff to National Chief Ovide Mercredi during the Charlottetown Constitutional Negotiations.

Harold is Senior Partner in the Aboriginal consulting firm of Gaspe Tarbell Associates, formed in1992, Mr. Tarbell provides group facilitation and training development services in such areas as strategic planning, consultation, policy development, team building, conflict resolution, board development, and youth programming for a wide variety of Aboriginal, corporate, and government organizations.

Meet Our Keynote Speakers



Gordon Peters

Gordon Peters is Lenape from the Delaware Nation and is of the turtle clan family. Gordon has a passion for life , culture and sovereignty which he readily transfers to others. Gord has worked with First Nations both politically and non-politically for 40 years. He has held the position of Grand chief fo rthe Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians (AIAI), and has served in his own communive as an elected

Councillor. Gord also served as the Ontario Regional Chief for 12 years, which including being a member of the AFN Executive.

He owns and operates a successful negotiation and consulting business. His hobbies include cultural undertakings, public education and writing.



Dr. Jennifer Walker

Jennifer Walker is a member of Six Nations and an Associate Professor in the Department of Health Research Methods, Evidence and Impact at McMaster University. She has a PhD in Community Health Sciences with a specialization in Epidemiology from the University of Calgary. She currently holds a Canada Research Chair in Indigenous Health Data and Aging.



Dr. Maggie Walter

Maggie Walter (PhD; FASSA) is Palawa, a member of the Tasmanian Briggs family. She is a Distinguished Professor of Sociology (Emerita) at the University of Tasmania and has published six books and more than 100 peer reviewed journal articles or research chapters. This body of work challenges standard explanations for Indigenous inequality, with a focus on the sub-fields of Indigenous data, Indigenous

methodologies and Indigenous Data Sovereignty. In May 2021, Maggie was appointed as one of five Commissioners with the Victorian Yoo-rrook Justice Commission. Yoorrook is Australia's first truth-telling body instructed to inquire into systemic injustices from colonisation to the present. The Commission's final report is due in 2024.

Herbie Barnes

Herbie Barnes is an Anishnabe from Aundeck Omni Kaning on Manitoulin Island. He is the founder of Little Red Barnes Productions, a Producer, a Director, a Musician and a Playwright. He best known for his role of Joseph in the film Dance Me Outside, and on the CBC series The Rez. Herbie is currently the Creative Director with the Young Peoples theatre in Toronto. The first Indigenous

person to hold this prestigious position.

The Future of Our Data

You will learn about the future of First Nations data in Ontario. You will hear about the development of the First Nations Data Governance Strategy and the positive impact this will have on First Nations data governance. You will also be shown a health data landscape scan, which identified how First Nations health data is managed and collected in Ontario.

First Nations Research in Action: The First Nations Regional Health Survey – Past, Present and Now

You will learn more about the First Nations Regional Health Survey, how they collect data, and what this data is used for. You can also see how complex the process of data collection can be and how the regional health survey has been adjusted to have a successful collection rate based on lessons learned from previous surveys.

First Nations Research in Action: Empowering Research from a Community and Cultural Lens Panel

This panel will teach you about First Nations research from a cultural and community lens. You will learn about the work Mamow Ahyamowen has done and how communities and organizations came together to secure First Nations data for change. You will also learn about First Nations research ethics and how they differ from mainstream research ethics.

COVID-19: Modeling First Nations Pandemic

This panel will give you insight into the impacts of the pandemic on First Nations people and what has been done in response. You will learn about the impacts of COVID-19 on First Nations health and lessons we have learned from the pandemic. You will also learn about tools that were created in response to the pandemic to better prepare First Nations people for the future.

Tools and Resources Panel

This panel will teach you about the numerous tools and resources available to individuals and researchers. You will learn about the past 25 years of OCAP, as well as new training that is available. You will be shown how to access community data at ICES, how data drives changes, and how research can turn into action.

Community Based Cultural Approaches

You will see how community-based cultural approaches are utilized in research. These include the Children's Health and Well Being Measure and the Native Wellness Assessment.

COO Research Initiatives

You will learn about different research initiatives Chiefs of Ontario sectors are working on. These include a risk and danger assessment tool, a look at First Nations data as it relates to the great lakes water quality agreement, and a project on economic development.

Dr. Ryan Bowie

Dr. Bowie is a Program Manager in the Environment Sector for the Chiefs of Ontario. His work focuses on the Great Lakes region, specifically First Nations involvement with the policies and agreements that manage Great Lakes water quality and ecosystem health. He also leads engagement for the Chiefs of Ontario on the proposed Canada Water Agency.

He holds an MA in Canadian and Indigenous Studies from Trent University, and a PhD in Environmental Studies from York University.

grandsons that are my whole world. Everything I do, I do in hopes of making this a better world for my children and grandchildren. I am also an animal lover and have 2 cats and 3 dogs. I would have many more if I could. I am hoping to someday be able to move to the country where I can have as many animals as I want.



Sydney Chabot-Hamden

Sydney Chabot-Hamden is an Anishinabe kwe from Kitigan Zibi, raised in Toronto, Ontario. Sydney is the Community Outreach and Communications Coordinator for the Aanish Naa Gegii: The Children's Health and Wellbeing Measure (ACHWM). She has a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Western University and is a Certified Holistic Nutritionist (CNP). With multiple years of experience working in

Indigenous organizations and businesses, she works to reconnect with her culture while giving back to communities across Turtle Island through health promotion and wellness-based work.



Erin Corston

Erin Corston is a member the Chapleau Cree First Nation (Cree: $\Box \Box \Delta \sigma \sigma \cdot d'$, šaplo ininiwak). She was born and raised in Treaty 9 Territory. After more than a decade in the public service, Erin shifted her professional career to the not-for-profit environment to focus on expanding her knowledge and expertise in First Nations' determinants of health. Working primarily at the national level, Erin

has contributed to the development and implementation of several major First Nations-led initiatives. Her current work at FNIGC is focused on advancing First Nations' rights over their data, through the implementation of the First Nations Data Governance Strategy.



Dr. Aaron Franks

Aaron is the Senior Research Manager, OCAP® and Information Governance at the First Nations Information Governance Centre. He holds an MA in Social Justice and Equity Studies from Brock University and a PhD in Human Geography from the University of Glasgow. He has worked with the Centre for Environmental Health Equity (CEHE) at the University of Manitoba and Queen's University,

the Centre for Indigenous Research Creation at Queen's, SSHRC, and Universities Canada. He now belongs to a team dedicated to applied research and education in the First Nations Principles of OCAP®, information governance, and First Nations data sovereignty. Originally from Edmonton in Treaty Six territory, Aaron is of British, Northern European, and Metis descent with roots in the Anglo-Metis communities of St. Andrews, MB, and Birch Hills, SK. He is a member of the Manitoba Metis Federation and lives on unceded Algonquin territory in Ottawa with his family.



Tara Gomes

Tara Gomes is the Scientific Director of Urban and Community Health at Unity Health Toronto and holds a Canada Research Chair in Drug Policy Research and Evaluation. Her research program focuses on drug safety and drug policy research, with a specific interest in developing evidence to inform policies that address the ongoing drug toxicity crisis across Canada and that integrate perspectives of impacted communities.



Maureen Gustafson

Maureen Gustafson is Anishinaabekwe of mixed Ojibwe and European settler ancestry. A member of Couchiching First Nation, she grew up nearby in Fort Frances. Carol has spent more than 25 years in the field of First Nations substance use and mental

health. She holds both a Master of Social Work Degree from the University of

Toronto and is 4th degree Midewiwin, a sacred Anishinaabe medicine society where she is a Chief and Teacher. Carol has throughout her career, made use of Indigenous knowledge in research, policy, practice-based evidence, teaching, and education, and in facilitating processes of decolonization specific to epistemic racism. She has co-chaired national initiatives known for best practice in national policy review and development, resulting in the: First Nations Mental Wellness Continuum Framework (FNMWC), the Honouring Our Strengths: A Renewed Framework to Address Substance Use Issues Among First Nations in Canada, the Indigenous Wellness Framework, and the Native Wellness Assessment. Her leadership has been engaged within Health and Mental Health for First Nations, Provincial, Territorial, and Federal governments serving several expert advisory and task groups.



Jason Jacques

Jason Jacques is a Senior Fellow with the Institute for Fiscal Studies and Democracy (IFSD) at the University of Ottawa. The results of the report were shared during the 2023 COO Health Forum and will be discussed once more during the Powering up Data Sovereignty Conference. FIRST NATIONS DATA GOVERNANCE STRATEGY

Towards a Regional Information Governance Centre

Ontario First Nations have done leading work in data driven research projects aimed at understanding and addressing socio-economic and health outcome inequalities and strengthening their communities.

In order to advance this work, Ontario through the Data Champion Team lead by Mariette Sutherland and under the guidance of the Data Champion Advisory Committee (see attached list) has begun implementing the First Nations Data Governance Strategy (FNDGS) (Introducing a First Nations Data Governance Strategy - The First Nations Information Governance Centre (fnigc.ca)).

The Strategy envisions a First Nations-led regional information governance centre networked with others across the country, designed and built based on needs and priorities expressed by Ontario First Nations. The centre will provide First Nations with timely access to quality data in order to make informed decisions and plan for the future and to deliver the services needed in the community.

The Strategy, itself, is rooted in community-driven and Nation-based collaborative approaches and charts the path necessary to further advance First Nations' self-determination. This begins with putting data back into the hands of First Nations communities in keeping with the fullest expression of OCAP principles.

A needed first step is engagement with First Nations to establish collaborative relationships, assess needs and priorities and draft a plan for the Centre. Interested in learning more? Phase 4 is scheduled to launch in 2023/2024

The First Nations Regional Health Survey (RHS) is the first—and only—national health survey created, conducted, and carried out by First Nations people for First Nations people.


Now in it's fourth phase, results from the RHS have been used to support policy and programming at the community, regional, and national level.

Rooted in Traditional and western understandings of health and well-being, the RHS gathers information from First Nations people living on reserve and in Northern First Nations communities.

The RHS is carried out by the First Nations Information Governance Centre (FNIGC), a non-profit First Nations organization that has been doing surveys on reserve and in Northern First Nations communities in collaboration with its Regional Partners since 1997.
